Guard Your Heart from Fear: Psalm 56:1-11


Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life. – Prov 4:23

#### ...phobia

- ? What are you most afraid of? How does this fear impact your decision-making?
- ? What has been the most <u>unhelpful</u> advice you've ever received in trying to rid yourself of a phobia? Why was the advice unhelpful? What would have been a better solution to offer, that did not elicit more fear?

#### Fear + Shame = Freeze

- ? As in the Geico commercial about decisions made in fear, the teenagers hide behind chainsaws instead of getting in the running car and leaving the horror scene. What are some of the consequences caused by indecision because of fear?
- ? Why do you feel shame in admitting your fears?
- ? Why is shame a roadblock to finding help in your fears?
- ? What would it take for the fear to no longer have a grip in your daily life?
- ? What happens to your heart when "prbgtc" (pray, read your bible, go to church) fails to rid you of your fear? Remember that David was a man after God's own heart and a "fearless" warrior, yet he feigned insanity because of his foniasophobia-fear of being murdered?<sup>1</sup> (1 Sam 21:13)



? How could it be considered a good a good thing when the pat (church) answers fail to rid you of your fear?

### Name it + Claim Him = Freedom

- ? How can verbally recognizing your fear help free you from it?
- ? "Fear is not the absence of faith. It's the incentive for faith." Do you agree or disagree? Explain.

### The Spirit of Power

- ? Being relinquished from fear is an inside job accomplished though the Holy Spirit. Why do we so often try to solve things on our own before *"being strengthened with power though your inner being?"* Do we not think that the issue is important enough to call upon the Holy Spirit? Do we struggle calling out to God out of the fear that we will be disappointed when he doesn't answer us?
- ? What kind of power does the Holy Spirit bring to us, as shown in Acts1:8? What does this look like in everyday life?

FOR GOD GAVE US A SPIRIT NOT OF FEAR BUT OF POWER AND LOVE AND SELF-CONTROL. - 2 TIM ]:7

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth. " Acts 1:8

- ? It's often been said that charismatics "run wild with the Holy Spirit's power" and Baptists "stuff it in a box." Do you agree or disagree? Why or why not?
- ? Read Ephesians 3:16-19. What does it mean to truly *comprehend* "the love of Christ"? Can we still say that we *know* the Love of Christ if we are consumed with fear? What is going on in my heart if I've been praying/begging for the strength to comprehend the love of God and yet find myself so often still filled with fear?

# The Spirit of Love

- ? **Am I loved?** How does the enemy work at eroding our confidence in being loved by God and why do we listen?
- ? Read 1 John 4:19.

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear. For fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not been perfected in love."

- ? If I am living in fear, is it true then that I don't possess "perfect love"? Does this then also mean that I haven't surrendered my heart to Jesus if I'm still living in fear? Why or why not?
- ? Proverbs 9:10 calls us into *"the fear of the Lord,"* and yet 1 John 4:19 says perfect love casts out fear. Define fear in each of these contexts and describe how you discern their differences.
- ? Sometimes the church is the last place one goes if they aren't feeling loved. It may even be the place where some have been most wounded. Why is this?
- ? Many of Jesus' harshest words of judgment were reserved for the religious, not the sinner. Why do we often get this backwards in the church today, and how could we modify our culture to better reflect our Savior? Do we often fail to exercise love because we don't want to enable sin?

# **The Spirit of Self-Control**

- ? Self-control literally means "a sound mind." What does it look like in daily life when one possesses a sound mind grounded in scripture? What wages war against it?
- ? How does consuming 24-hour news constantly work at eroding a mind stayed on Christ?
- ? What Scriptures can you call to mind that settle your mind in times of fear?
- ? In 1999, Minnesota's Governor Jessie (*the Body*) Ventura was interviewed by a magazine and he said the following: "Organized religion is a sham and a crutch for weak-minded people who need strength in numbers,"<sup>2</sup> As abhorrent as that statement was from a sitting governor, he is not alone. Why do so many share his opinion about Christianity? Is he right?
- ? So often, fear is driven by the "what if's" instead of the here and now. How do the "what if's" draw us to madness and why are they so hard to shut off?
- ? The famed theologian Karl Barth remarked that a single song summed up the entirety of his life's work and theology. This is what he said: "Yes, in the words of a song my mother used to sing me, 'Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so.<sup>3</sup>" Why are the words "Jesus Loves Me" so profound and lifechanging?

#### The Story behind Jesus Loves Me Anna Bartlett Warner (1827–1915)

In the context of the story, a sick boy, Johnny, is being comforted by his teacher, Mr. Linden, who offers these words to the child, thus the words relating to weakness, illness, and even the promise of heaven.<sup>4</sup> SAY AND SEAL.

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An earnest, somewhat wistful glance of Faith's eye was the answer; it was not a dissenting answer, but it went back to Johnny. Her lip was a child's lip in its humbleness.

ness. "It was very hard for me to give him up at first—" Mr. Linden went on softly; and the voice said it was yet; "but that answers all questions. 'The good Husbandman may pluck his roses, and gather in his lilies at mid-summer, and, for aught I dare say, in the beginning of the first summer month.'"\_

Faith looked at the little human flower in her arms-and was silent.

"Reuben was telling me yesterday-" she said after a few minutes,--" what you have been to him."

But her words touched sweet and bitter things—Mr. Linden did not immediately answer,—his head drooped a little on his hand, and he did not raise it again until Johnny claimed his attention.

The quiet rest of the little sleeper was passing off, changing into an unquiet waking; not with the fear of yesterday but with a restlessness of discomfort that was not easily soothed. Words and caresses seemed to have lost their quieting power for the time, though the child's face never failed to answer them; but he presently held out his arms to Mr. Linden, with the words, "Walk—like last night."

And for a while then Faith had nothing to do but to look and listen; to listen to the soft measured steps through the room, to watch the soothing, resting effect of the motion on the sick child, as wrapped in Mr. Linden's arms he was carried to and fro. She could tell how it wrought from the quieter, unbent muscles—from the words which by degrees Johnny began to speak. But after a while, one of these words was, "Sing."—Mr. Linden did not stay his walk, but though his tone was almost as low as his footsteps, Faith heard every word.
